

PASTOR'S PONDERABLES

Pril is a potpourri for the Christian church this year. We are still on our journey to the cross with Jesus for the better part of the month. We will travel with him through Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, sit at the table with him on Maundy Thursday, then, if we have the courage, remain with him at the foot of the cross on Good Friday. Then we have the glorious celebration of the Easter resurrection. This year we will also be confirming Zachary Fetter on this day when we resurrect the "Alleluias." This is the time when we also make hard boiled eggs, color them and hide them for children of all ages



to find. We also remember that an empty egg can be a symbol of the empty tomb that three women in Luke's gospel this year find as they are laden down with spices on the first day of the week to anoint Jesus body. Instead, they are greeted by two angels that tell them, "Christ is risen!" And we echo this exclamation with, "He is risen indeed!"

There is a Ukrainian folk tale that explains one origin of the Easter egg. One day a poor peddler went to the marketplace to sell a basket of eggs. He came upon a crowd mocking a man who staggered with a heavy cross on which he was about to be crucified. The peddler ran to his aid, leaving the basket by the roadside. When he returned, he found the eggs transformed into exquisite designs of bright colors. The man was Christ; the peddler was Simon. And the eggs were to become the symbol of rebirth for all humankind.

Eggs are a part of the springtime celebrations in many religions. An egg is placed on the Jewish Seder plate for Passover, and decorated eggs are shared during the Persian New Year. It seems that with more daylight hours in spring, poultry lay more eggs. The Eastern Orthodox church has the tradition of dying eggs red. This may stem from a legend about Mary Magdalene who sought an audience before the Roman Emperor, Tiberius Caesar. Anyone who appeared before Caesar was expected to bring a gift, so Mary Magdalene brought a plain, ordinary egg. She came before the imperial throne holding out the egg in her


hand and greeting Tiberias, declaring: "Christ is Risen!" She told him about her teacher and savior, Jesus, and the unfair treatment and death penalty he'd received from Caesar's own governor, Pontius Pilate. She also told him how Jesus had risen from the dead and appeared, alive, to her and all his disciples. Caesar responded with bored disbelief, "How can anyone rise from the dead? That's as impossible as that egg in your hand turning red." And, miraculously, the egg in her hand turned from white to a deep red.

In Orthodox iconography, Mary Magdalene is often pictured holding up this red egg in her hand, sometimes with the words, "Christ is risen" printed on the icon. (article by Heidi Haverkamp "Symbols of the Resurrection." Gather April 2019 - a magazine of WELCA)



FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

s we once again remember the final days of Jesus' earthly life and celebrate his resurrection, a number of special musical selections have been planned for our services on Palm/Passion Sunday (April 14), Maundy Thursday (April 18), Good Friday (April 19), and Easter Sunday (April 21).

During Holy Week, our Jerusalem Choir will sing *Christ for Us Became Obedient unto Death* by Gerald Near (Palm/Passion Sunday), *Ave Verum Corpus* by Camille Saint-Saëns (Maundy Thursday), and *Upon the Cross Extended by* Leonhard Lechner (Good Friday). Organ voluntaries will include *Processional March* by William H. Harris and *Chorale Prelude on "O Lamm Gottes, unschuldig"* by Johann Pachelbel on Palm/Passion Sunday, as well as *Adoro te devote* by Léon Boëllmann on Maundy Thursday.

Our liturgy on Easter Sunday will include several musical highlights. The Jerusalem Choir will sing *Christ Is Arisen!* by George Frideric Handel as the offertory anthem. *Trumpet Tune in D Major* by David N. Johnson will be offered as the prelude and *Toccata* from *Symphony No. 5* by Charles-Marie Widor will be the postlude. Timpanist Jeff Schreiber will accompany many of our hymns that day, including such favorites as *Jesus Christ Is Risen Today* (*ELW* #365), *The Strife Is O'er, the Battle Done* (*ELW* #366), and *Christ Is Risen! Alleluia!* (*ELW* #382). *Christ Our Passover*, an Easter hymn by Carl P. Daw, Jr. set to Ralph Vaughan William's stirring SINE NOMINE tune, will be sung as the Hymn of the Day. During communion, we will sing Martin Luther's great Easter chorale "Christ Jesus Lay in Death's Strong Bands" (*ELW* #370). A chorale prelude by Friedrich Wilhelm Zachau based on CHRSIT LAG IN TODESBANDEN, the tune paired with Luther's text, will precede the singing of the hymn. Written by the contemporary American hymn writer Brian Wren, *Christ Is Risen! Shout Hosanna!* (*ELW* #383) will be sung as our second communion hymn to Ludwig van Beethoven's well-known HYMN TO JOY tune.

EXPLORING THE CEMETERY

CSI (Cemetery Scene Investigation)

As you drive into the cemetery from Church Street, there is a gravestone on your left, about 2/3 of the way back, that says "Bender." That's it - no other information - no names or dates. Checking the cemetery file cards was not helpful since they merely declared that some of the gravesites in lot 104 were "full."



So, who is buried in lot 104? Skimming the Lititz Record for something else, I found an obituary notice for Robert William Bender, just two months old, who was buried in the cemetery in September 1918. Checking for his parents, William McKinley Bender and Maggie (Steinmetz) Bender, I discovered that they were also buried in the cemetery, location unknown. Add in a sister Dorothy, who died in 1935 at age 11, of polio, and Maggie Steinmetz Bender's mother, Barbara (Bealor) Steinmetz, and you start to get a sense of who must be in the plot.

Because the burials were posted on findagrave.com, I heard from a descendant who could confirm that this plot is indeed that of this Bender family. In addition to the people mentioned above, the

William McKinley Bender was the son of Franklin Ruhl Bender and his wife, Annie (Stark) Bender, who are also both buried in the cemetery, as are Annie's parents, William and Elizabeth (Zwalley) Stark.
